An NIH-funded postdoctoral research position is available in the laboratory of Tim Corson, PhD, at the Leslie Dan Faculty of Pharmacy at the University of Toronto. We are seeking an individual with proven excellent communication skills, independence, and drive to join our multidisciplinary research group, focusing on the pathogenesis of, and drug discovery for, ocular neovascularization. The successful candidate will work to evaluate novel antiangiogenic therapeutic interventions using biochemical, cell-based, and animal models. Required qualifications:

An earned PhD, MD or equivalent degree within the last five years, with published evidence of hands-on experience with rodent eye disease models and genetics, tissue culture, immunoblot, and immunohistochemistry is required. Experience with molecular biology and cell signaling, plus demonstrated interest in eye diseases, bioinformatics, and/or vascular biology are advantageous but not essential.

Salary – Salary in the \$50,000 to \$60,000 per annum range.

The normal hours of work are 40 hours per week for a full-time postdoctoral fellow (pro-rated for those holding a partial appointment) recognizing that the needs of the employee's research and training and the needs of the supervisor's research program may require flexibility in the performance of the employee's duties and hours of work.
